Optional Router Configuration

- **Access Router Settings:** Log in via a web browser using the router's IP (commonly 192.168.0.1 or 192.168.1.1) and admin credentials .

- **Enable DHCP:** Ensure the router assigns IP addresses automatically to devices connected through the switch .

- **Update Wi-Fi Settings:** Configure SSID, password, and security protocol (WPA2/WPA3) if needed .

- **Firmware Updates:** Check for updates to improve performance and security .

Tips

- **Multiple Switches:** You can daisy-chain additional switches to expand your network further .

- **Use LAN Ports Only:** Do not connect the switch to the router's WAN port; this is reserved for the internet connection .

- **Wired vs Wireless:** Devices connected via Ethernet to the switch generally experience faster and more stable connections than Wi-Fi . By following these steps, you can effectively expand your network, providing reliable wired connections for multiple devices while maintaining seamless wireless access.
