- Group logically: Organize wires by area (e.g., upstairs/downstairs) or function (lighting, power, dedicated appliances) for easier identification .
- Record a circuit schedule: Maintain a chart or table near the distribution box showing each circuit and its corresponding breaker .

Best Practices

- Label only once, high on the wire: This ensures the label remains visible even after cutting or splicing .
- Update labels regularly: Check and refresh labels if circuits are modified or new devices are added .
- Follow standards: Ensure labeling complies with local electrical codes, such as BS 7671 in the UK or NEC in the US .
- Dedicated circuits for high-current appliances: Clearly mark cookers, showers, EV chargers, and other high-load devices .
