

Prices of Dual-mode and Single-mode Fiber Optics

Factors Affecting Pricing

- **Strand Count:** More strands increase cost proportionally. For example, a 12-strand cable may cost around \$0.50 per foot, while a 24-strand cable can reach \$1.00 per foot .



- **Cable Construction:** Indoor riser-rated cables are cheaper than plenum-rated cables. Armored or direct-burial cables for harsh environments can range from \$0.50 to \$5 per foot .
- **Connectorization and Pre-Termination:** Pre-terminated assemblies and patch cables are more expensive due to factory termination and connector type .
- **Installation Environment:** Outdoor conduits, trenching, or bore work can significantly increase total project costs. Labor and permits may add \$2-\$6 per foot on top of material costs .

Total Project Costs

- **Short indoor runs (e.g., 500 ft SMF):** Cable cost ~\$0.25/ft; total project including labor and terminations: \$1,000-\$1,600 .
- **Medium office runs (e.g., 2,000 ft OM4 multimode):** Cable cost ~\$0.60/ft; total project: \$3,000-\$5,000 .
- **Long outdoor runs (e.g., 4,500 ft SMF with trenching and protective ducting):** Cable cost ~\$0.90/ft; total project: \$11,000-\$22,000 .

Cost Considerations

- **Single-mode fiber** has a higher initial cost but offers long-term scalability and supports higher-speed, long-distance transmissions, making it a better investment for backbone or campus networks .
- **Multimode fiber** is more economical for short-range, high-density applications, such as within data centers, but may require upgrades sooner if network speeds increase .
- **Dual-mode considerations:** While dual-mode fiber is less common, multimode fiber can support multiple wavelengths (SWDM) to extend reach and density, affecting cost and optics selection .
