Fiber optic internet delivers data via light signals through fiber cables, which are converted to an Ethernet connection by an Optical Network Terminal (ONT) installed by your ISP. Your current router can be used if it has a WAN Ethernet port capable of handling the speeds provided by your fiber plan. The router connects to the ONT via an Ethernet cable, and from there, it distributes the connection to your devices. However, older routers designed for DSL or cable may limit your speeds or fail to support gigabit connections. Routers with outdated Wi-Fi standards (Wi-Fi 4 or Wi-Fi 5) may not fully leverage fiber's high bandwidth.

When to Upgrade

Upgrading is recommended if:

- Your router does not have a Gigabit WAN port.
- You want to take advantage of multi-gigabit fiber plans.

- You need better Wi-Fi coverage or support for newer standards like Wi-Fi 6 or Wi-Fi 7.
- You want advanced features such as LAN port aggregation, QoS, or enhanced security . Most ISPs provide a fiber-compatible router with installation, which is pre-configured to work seamlessly with their network . Keeping the ISP-provided router is often the simplest way to ensure optimal performance, though you can replace it with a high-performance router if desired .

Recommended Router Features for Fiber

When selecting a router for fiber internet, consider:

- Gigabit or multi-gigabit WAN and LAN ports to handle high-speed connections.
- Latest Wi-Fi standard (Wi-Fi 6 or Wi-Fi 7) for maximum wireless performance.
- Strong CPU and RAM to manage multiple devices and high data throughput.
- Advanced features like LAN aggregation, MU-MIMO, and robust security options .
